## **Caterpillars** ~~ Food for Baby Birds

Insects—especially caterpillars—are crucially important for raising baby birds. This list ranks local native plants by the number of butterfly and moth species that use them as host plants for their caterpillars and includes those plants most likely to be used in the garden and commercially available. The list was compiled from <u>www.nwf.org/NativePlantFinder</u> for Eureka, CA (zip code 95501), based on the research of Douglas Tallamy. The (number) is the number of caterpillar species reported for each plant. Note that the number of caterpillar species on the list is <u>only</u> valid for native plant species. Nonnative species in the same genus (Japanese Maple, for instance) typically support 50% fewer species of caterpillars.
